Our Division meetings are held on the second Thursday of each month. Bring you news, ideas, and smiles.



Political Education & FFAI November (Samhain)

Dia dhaiibh.

The 1st of November is *Lá Fhéile na Naomh Uile* or All Saints Day followed by All Souls Day. Opposite May Day it marks the beginning of the cold season. A day dedicated to honor our great saints who intercede on our behalf followed by a day dedicated to our deceased who also likely need intercession.

Some recent events of concern, as we know the UK withdrew from the European Union (an tAontas Eorpachn) in 2016 – Brexit! Up to this time a requisite for being part of the EU has been the following of the ECHR European Council of Human Rights. ECHR was formed mostly in the 1950s in response to atrocities that took place all over Europe in WWII. The ECHR is an integral part of Good Friday. The withdraw of Britain means that in UK law, the areas previously covered by ECHR will likely have to be redrafted. This opens a window going forward by which Britain may likely seek to avoid previous protections and obligations. This is both a hindrance to seeking public acknowledgment of state sponsored atrocities that took place during The Troubles and also an ominous opening for the British State, should The Good Friday Agreement peace devolve. The readers are encouraged to hit the political channels such as legislators to call attention to this.

We are currently in an era of renegotiated and newly constructed economic trade agreements. While the US and Canada and The EU do not construct or enforce British laws, the protections of individuals against state sponsored violence, torture and unjust imprisonment such as those in ECHR are a prerequisite for trade deals with US, Canada and The EU. In this manner The US Congress and President can have **an absolute impact** on the affairs of The UK. My politics are frankly traditionalist and right-wing, but the Progressive element of the American electorate and Congress will be the first in line to insist on Human Rights protections in dealing with Britain. Speaker Pelosi, for example was for so long an opponent of my party in The US. As I recall though, she never needed convincing or even petitioning on the subject of enforcing GFA.

The hated UK Legacy Act is bring renegotiated. As of mid-October, Hilary Benn MP UK stated, "It is clear that a perfect outcome is not attainable." Simon Harris TD Republic of Ireland (*Poblacht na hÉireann*) said, "It is a complex framework but does lay the groundwork for a profound transformation." News in Britain is that there will be a laundry list of legal protections for veterans. This is an evolving story.

The terms 'bring to justice' and 'seek justice' are common terms in political language and certainly in issues connected to The Troubles (na Trioblóidí). I personally never use these terms in word or print. When I do, I put them in quotes indicated their meaning is subjective. I use the phrase 'seek public acknowledgement', that is make it known for history that these events took place. My attitude of this is that all these tragic events are part of a much larger centuries old objective. That is the geopolitical objective of Great Britain (an Bhreatain Mhór) to conquer Ireland (Éire) and the Irish people. Many people in civilian life seem to not understand this or understand Britain. My attitude is that the relationship was always adversarial and that a harmonious life for Irish Catholics under a British umbrella was never possible. In that sense, there never really is 'justice' only a successful reversal of Britannic influence.

"In no circumstances do I imagine the breakup of our Union in my lifetime...we can be confident that Michelle O'Neil's prediction of a border poll by 2030 will melt away faster than her credibility as the self-proclaimed First Minister for all!" - Gavin Robertson declared recently at DUP Party Conference in September

A movie *Anemone* by Daniel Day Lewis with Sean Bean appeared in theatres in Oct, all I will say to my fellow Hibernians is this Watch it... Watch it.

The adoption of the tricolour as the flag of Ireland

The Irish tricolour—green, white, and orange—emerged in the mid-19th century as a symbol of Irish nationalism and the aspiration for unity between the Catholic and Protestant communities. It was first publicly introduced in 1848 by Thomas Francis Meagher, a leader of the Young Ireland movement. Meagher, inspired by the French Revolution and its tricolour flag, declared that the green symbolized Irish Catholics and nationalists, the orange represented Irish Protestants, particularly those aligned with William of Orange, and the white in the center stood for peace between the two. Though powerful in symbolism, the flag's early use was limited and primarily associated with radical political circles.

After the failed Young Ireland rebellion of 1848, the tricolour did not immediately become a widely recognized national emblem. However, throughout the latter half of the 19th century, its use slowly expanded as the nationalist movement evolved. During the Land War of the late 1870s and early 1880s—a period of intense agrarian agitation led by the Irish National Land League—the flag appeared sporadically at rallies and meetings. Although more commonly associated with the green flag bearing a harp, the tricolour began to surface as a symbol of more inclusive national unity, appealing to both moderate and radical elements.

In the 1880s and 1890s, the tricolour gained further visibility through the Home Rule movement, which aimed to secure Irish self-government within the United Kingdom. Led by Charles Stewart Parnell, the Home Rule campaign emphasized constitutional methods rather than violent rebellion. Supporters occasionally displayed the tricolour at demonstrations and political events, linking it with the evolving democratic and national aspirations of the Irish people. By the turn of the century, the flag had become increasingly recognized as a unifying national symbol, though it still competed with other nationalist imagery.

Its defining moment came during the 1916 Easter Rising, when Irish republicans raised the green, white, and orange over the General Post Office in Dublin. This act powerfully linked the flag with the cause of complete Irish independence. Although the Rising was crushed, the symbolism of the tricolour endured, and by the time of the Irish Free State's formation in 1922, it had firmly established itself as the national flag of Ireland.




